'A' LEVEL DRAMA AND THEATRE



WHAT DOESTHEA LEVEL COURSE INVOLVE?

- There are three units to this A level;
- Component I Devising Unit Devise a performance inspired by an extract from a play and incorporates techniques used by a key practitioner. Complete a portfolio.
- Component 2 Scripted Performance Perform two extracts from two different plays. One as part of a group and one as a monologue or a duologue.
- Component 3 Written Paper.
- Section A Live theatre question.
- Section B 2 questions on an unseen extract from a performance text.
- Section C One extended response based on an unseen named section from a chosen performance text.

COMPONENT ONE – DEVISED PERFORMANCE

- Internally assessed and externally moderated.
- There are two parts to the assessment:
- Portfolio (60 marks)
- The portfolio submission recommendations are: handwritten/typed evidence between 2500–3000 words or recorded/verbal evidence between 12–14 minutes.
- 2) Devised performance (20 marks).


COMPONENTTWO - TEXT PERFORMANCE

- Externally assessed by a visiting examiner.
- Group performance (36 marks).
- Monologue or duologue (24 marks).

COMPONENT THREE – WRITTEN EXAM

- Section A: Live Theatre Evaluation (20 marks) Students answer one question from a choice of two requiring them to analyse and evaluate a live theatre performance.
- Section B: Page to Stage. (36 marks) Students answer two extended response questions based on an unseen extract from the performance text they have studied. Students answer from the perspective of a performer and a designer.
- Section C: Interpreting a Performance Text (24 marks) Students will answer one extended response question
 from a choice of two based on an unseen named section from their chosen performance text. Students will
 demonstrate how their re-imagined production concept will communicate ideas to a contemporary audience
 influenced by a practitioner.
